Know your trees

Horse Chestnut

Horse chestnut trees can grow to 100 feet high! They can also

live for at least 300 years!





The fruit of the trees belongs to the nut family. The nuts are protected by a hard husk and is covered with spikes! We know them as conkers. A conker is the seed of the horse chestnut. The chestnuts are an important food source for the animals. There is a horse chestnut tree in our ECO garden. Look out for the conkers in the autumn.





This issue's land animal...

Giant Panda.

With only around 2060 pandas living in the wild, the giant panda is considered vulnerable of extinction by the \underline{IUCN} . Due to the fact that pandas reproduce so infrequently, it is very difficult for their population to recover from such a low point.

One the main reasons that panda populations have declined is habitat destruction. As the human population in China continues to grow, pandas' habitat gets taken over by development, pushing them into smaller and less liveable areas. Habitat destruction also leads to food shortages. Pandas feed on several varieties of bamboo that bloom at different times of the year. If one type of bamboo is destroyed by development, it can leave the pandas with nothing to eat during the time it normally blooms, increasing the risk of starvation.






Pollution


Plastic Pollution is destroying our earth. Right now, there is an estimated amount of 315 billion pounds of plastic in our ocean. There are many different types of pollution such as:

- 6. Thermal pollution




KIDS AGAINST PLASTIC



The great plastic garbage patch

The GPGP covers an estimated surface area of 1.6 (16000) million square kilometres, an area twice the size of Texas (or three times the size of France).

It is estimated that 1.15 (11500) to 2.41 (24100) million tonnes of plastic are entering the ocean each year from rivers! More than half of this plastic is less dense (dense means compact which means squished together) so it will not sink instead it stays on top of the water.

The mass of the plastic in the Great Plastic Garbage Patch was estimated to be approximately 80,000 tonnes (4-16 times more than previous calculations). This weight is also equivalent to 500 Jumbo Jets, which is heavy.
